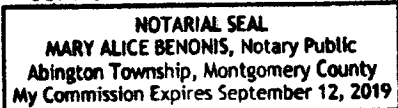

Notes to Financial Statements December 31, 2015

1. Organization

WNJ Capital, Inc. (the "Company") is a registered broker dealer with the Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC") and is a member of the Financial Industry Regulatory Authority ("FINRA "). The Company was incorporated under the laws of the state of Pennsylvania on October 4, 2010. The Company, like other broker dealers, is directly affected by general economic and market conditions, including fluctuations in volume and price level of securities, changes in interest rates and securities brokerage services, all of which have an impact on the Company's liquidity.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The following are the significant accounting policies followed by the Company in the preparation of its financial statements. The policies are in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP").

Revenue—Securities transactions and related commission revenue are recorded on a trade date basis.

Concentration of credit risks – The Company maintains its cash in bank deposit accounts which, at times, may exceed federally insured limits. The Company has not experienced any losses in such accounts. Management believes the Company is not exposed to any significant credit risk related to cash.

The Company is engaged in various trading and brokerage activities in which counterparties primarily include broker-dealers, banks, and other financial institutions. In the event counterparties do not fulfill their obligations, the Company may be exposed to risk. The risk of default depends on the creditworthiness of the counterparty or issuer of the instrument.

Depreciation – Fixed asset purchases are classified as three or seven-year property for depreciation purposes. They are depreciated under accelerated methods.

Cash and cash equivalents – The Company includes as cash and cash equivalents amounts invested in money market mutual funds.

Income taxes – The Company, with the consent of its stockholder, has elected to be taxed under the sanctions of federal law as an S corporation. As a result of this election, no provision has been made for income taxes. Instead stockholders individually pay tax on their pro-rata share of Company's income.

The Company recognizes and discloses uncertain tax positions in accordance with GAAP. As of, and during the year ended, December 31, 2015, the Company did not have liability for unrecognized tax benefits. The Company is no longer subject to examination by federal and state taxing authorities for tax periods prior to 2012.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Fair Value- FASB ASC 820 defines fair value, establishes a framework for measuring fair value, and establishes a fair value hierarchy which prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. A fair value measurement assumes that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability occurs in the principal market for the asset or liability or, in the absence of a principal market, the most advantageous market. Valuation techniques that are consistent with the market, income or cost approach, as specified by FASB ASC 820, are used to measure fair value.

The fair value hierarchy prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value into three broad levels:

- Level 1 inputs are quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities the Company has the ability to access.
- Level 2 inputs are inputs (other than quoted prices included within Level 1) that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly.
- Level 3 are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability and rely on management's own assumptions about the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability. (The unobservable inputs should be developed based on the best information available in the circumstances and may include the Company's own data.)

The availability of observable inputs can vary from security to security and is affected by a wide variety of factors, including, for example, the type of security, the liquidity of markets, and other characteristics particular to the security. To the extent that valuation is based on models or inputs that are less observable or unobservable in the market, the determination of fair value requires more judgment. Accordingly, the degree of judgment exercised in determining fair value is greatest for instruments categorized in level 3.

The inputs used to measure fair value may fall into different levels of the fair value hierarchy. In such cases, for disclosure purposes, the level in the fair value hierarchy within which fair value measurement falls in its entirety is determined based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

The Company did not hold any Level 3 investments during the year ended December 31, 2015. The Company did not hold any derivative instruments at any time during the year ended December 31, 2015. There were no significant transfers into or out of Level 1 or Level 2 during the period. It is the Company's policy to recognize transfers into and out of Level 2 at the end of the reporting period.

Use of estimates – The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results may differ from those estimates and assumptions.

Subsequent events- Management has evaluated subsequent events through February 26, 2016, the date at which the financial statements were available to be issued and has determined that there were no subsequent events requiring recognition or disclosure in these financial statements.

3. Operating Leases

The Company leases office space under an operating lease that will expire in November 2017. The lease requires the Company to pay monthly minimum rent of \$3,584. Rent expense for the year ended December 31, 2015 was \$50,261.

The Company leases various technology software under an operating lease that will expire in June 2016. The lease requires the Company to pay a monthly fee of \$8,560. Expense for this service for the year ended December 31 was \$90,395.

4. Net Capital Requirements

The Company is a member of the FINRA and is subject to the SEC Uniform Net Capital Rule 15c3-1. This Rule requires the maintenance of minimum net capital and requires that the ratio of aggregate indebtedness to net capital, both as defined, shall not exceed 15 to 1. At December 31, 2015 the Company had net capital of \$857,897 which was \$757,897 in excess of its required net capital of \$100,000. The Company's net capital ratio was .0169 to 1.

5. Financial Instruments with Off Balance Sheet Risk

In the normal course of business, the Company is a party to financial instruments with off balance sheet risk. These financial instruments include outstanding delayed delivery, underwriting, future commitments and options contracts that involve elements of risks in excess of the amounts recognized in the statement of financial activities. These contracts are valued at market, and unrealized gains and losses are reflected in the financial statements. As of December 31, 2015, the Company held no derivative financial instruments used for hedging purposes.

6. Clearing Agreement

The Company maintains a clearing agreement with First Southwest Company ("FSC"). Under the agreement the Company maintains a clearing deposit which was \$979,438 at December 31, 2015. FSC will finance the Company's inventory under normal margin terms. The Company pays interest on any amount payable at prevailing Federal funds rate +.25, which was 0% at December 31, 2015. The Company owed FSC \$3,245,908 at December 31, 2015. Interest expense paid to FSC was \$ 34,483 for the year ended December 31, 2015.
